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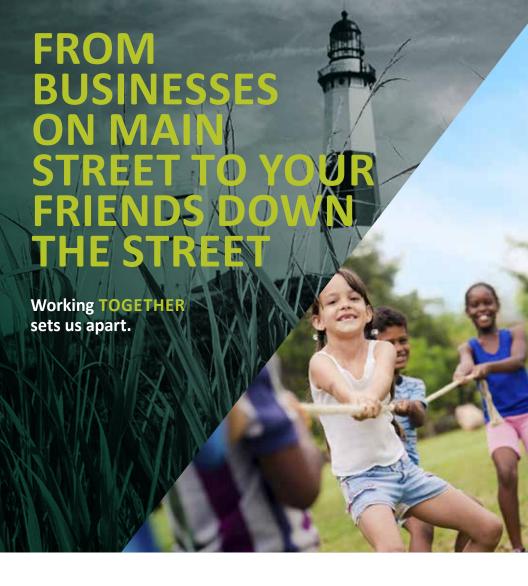


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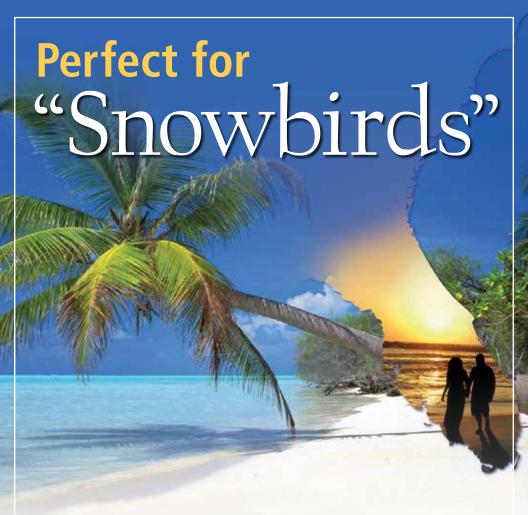

Finally, I want to acknowledge all of our loyal patrons, supporters, and partners. We are here for you, and without you, none of this would be possible.

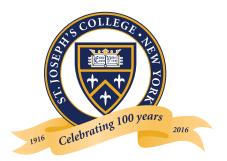
Thank you for allowing us to flourish and grow for over 66 years. Together we can make 2016 our best season yet!

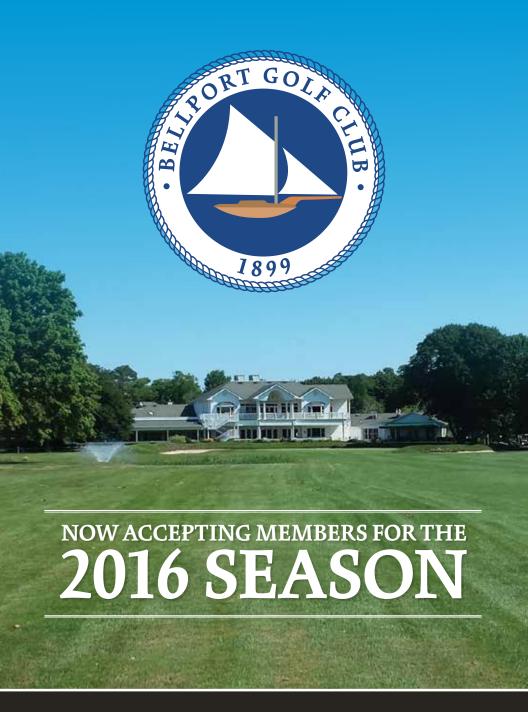

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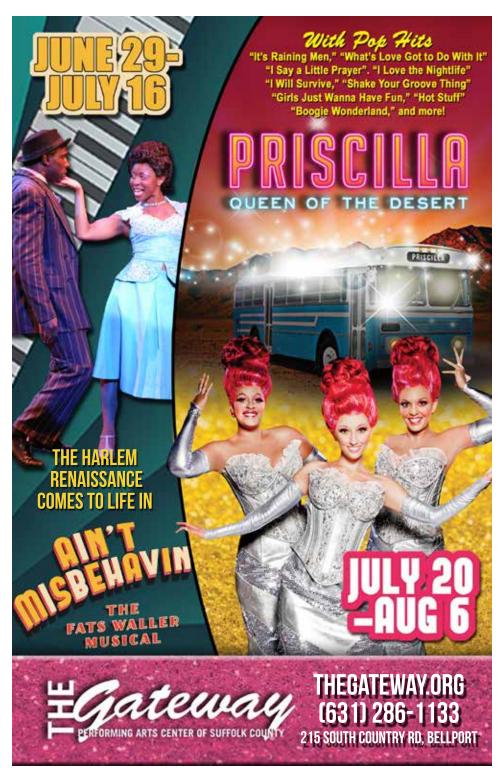


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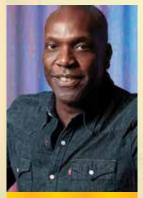
## Bringing Broadway Back Home...

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#### THE OFFICIAL STORY ACCORDING TO THE SUN RECORD COMPANY:

he Million Dollar Quartet is the name given to recordings made on Tuesday December 4, 1956 in the Sun Record Studios in Memphis, Tennessee. The recordings were of an impromptu jam session between Elvis Presley, Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins, and Johnny Cash. The jam session seems to have happened by pure chance. Perkins, who by this time had already met success with "Blue Suede Shoes," had come into the studios that day, accompanied by his brothers Clayton and Jay and by drummer W.S. Holland, their aim being to cut some new material, including a revamped version of an old blues song, "Matchbox." Sam Phillips, the owner of Sun Records, who wished to try to fatten this sparse rockabilly instrumentation, had brought in his latest acquisition, singer and piano man extraordinaire, Jerry Lee Lewis, still unknown outside Memphis, to play the piano on the Perkins session.

Sometime in the early afternoon, Elvis Presley, a former Sun artist himself, but now at RCA, dropped in to pay a casual visit accompanied by a girlfriend, Marilyn Evans. He was, at the time, the biggest name in show business, having hit the top of the singles charts five times, and topping the album charts twice in the preceding

12 month period. Less than four months earlier, he had appeared on The Ed Sullivan Show, pulling an unheard-of 83% of the television audience, which was estimated at 55 million, the largest in history, up to that time. After chatting with Philips in the control room, Presley listened to the playback of the Perkins' session, which he pronounced to be good. Then he went into the studio and some time later the iam session began. Phillips left the tapes running in order to "capture the moment" as a souvenir and for posterity. At some point during the session, Sun artist Johnny Cash, who had also enjoyed a few hits on the country charts, popped in (Cash noted in his autobiography Cash that it was he who was the first to arrive at Sun Studio that day). As Jerry Lee pounded away on the piano, Elvis and his girlfriend at some point slipped out. Cash claims in Cash that "no one wanted to follow Jerry Lee, not even Elvis".

The following day, an article, written by Memphis newspaperman Bob Johnson about the session, was published in the Memphis Press-Scimitar under the title. "Million Dollar Quartet." The article contained the now well known photograph of Elvis Presley seated at the piano surrounded by Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins and Johnny Cash. \*



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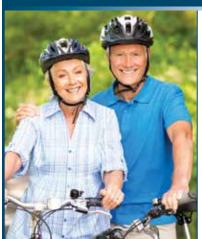
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### FOSTERING THE ARTS: An Interview with Director Hunter Foster

It's no wonder that the name "Hunter Foster" is synonymous with success, and is a household name for many theatre fans and Broadway-goers. Hunter Foster began his Broadway career as an ensemble member and understudy for such shows as Les Miserables, Grease, and Footloose, but then

was cast in his breakthrough role of Bobby Strong in the smash-hit satirical musical comedy *Urinetown*. After his breakthrough, Mr. Foster's career as a leading man on Broadway was launched. He took on the roles of Seymour (Little Shop of Horrors, for which he was nominated for a Tony for Best Actor in a Musical), Sam Phillips (Million Dollar Quartet), Benny (Hands on a Hardbody), and Bud (The Bridges of Madison County). In addition to his success on Broadway, Mr. Foster has also traveled the country to various prominent regional theatres. Mr. Foster's career and talent expand beyond performing, as he is a highly sought-after director, playwright and librettist, (for complete bio, please see page 20 of the Playbill). We are ecstatic to have him joining us at Gateway to direct Million Dollar Quartet, and were fortunate enough to be able to ask him some of our audience's burning questions.

## RC: What was your early inspiration(s) for becoming an actor?

**HF:** I was a big Indiana Jones fan, and all the early Spielberg movies. I wanted to be Harrison Ford or Richard Dreyfuss.

## RC: The dream of many actors in NYC is to be on Broadway. What was it like to go from dreaming about Broadway to being on Broadway?

**HF:** Broadway wasn't necessarily a dream of mine as a kid. I was more into movies, but once I learned about theater, I realized how special being on Broadway was. And being able to say you are a Broadway actor is a title that carries so much prestige and honor. No one should take it for granted.

## RC: What has been your favorite role thus far (in life or onstage)?

**HF:** *Urinetown* will always be my favorite experience. It was a great cast, and a joy to perform.

## RC: What was it like to receive your first Tony nomination? What did you think and how did you feel?

**HF:** I remember at the luncheon and we were told we were in a select group as Tony nominees, and it hit me then how special it is to be recognized for your work.

## RC: What was it like to be the first person to play the role of Sam Phillips? And did you do any special research to prepare yourself for the role?

**HF:** Before we started, I went to Sun Studios in Memphis because I wanted to understand what Sun Studios was all about. I also did a lot of research on the guartet themselves.

## RC: What was it like to transition from playing the role of Sam Phillips in *Million Dollar Quartet* to directing the show?

**HF:** I didn't think it was too difficult. I had a pretty good understanding of the show and what I wanted to do with it. You get great musicians, and then sing that material, and the audience eats it up.

## RC: Million Dollar Quartet is based on a true story. How does this effect/affect the way you direct the show and talk to the actors about their characters?

**HF:** I've asked them not to do imitations, necessarily, but (to embody) the essence of these men. Audiences will believe in the world you create, so we are trying to create a world where our versions of these characters live.

## RC: How do you keep *Million Dollar Quartet* fresh after being a part of it for so long?

**HF:** You have to keep reminding yourself to tell the story. There's a great story being told in this show and if you get away from it, you aren't doing your job.

## RC: If you could direct or star in any production, what would it be and why?

**HF:** I want to direct *Chess*. It's been a favorite of mine for a long time and I have an idea that I would love to try with it.

# RC: In The Gateway: School for the Performing Arts, we have many students who are aspiring performing artists, many of whom look up to and idolize Broadway veterans like yourself. What advice would you give to them?

**HF:** Learn who you are and what you do best. Don't try to be someone else. Your individuality is what will stand out. And be kind to each other. This business is hard enough. Be kind to all of those around you. A great director once told me to always make the other person more important than yourself, and if everyone does that, then we are all working together.

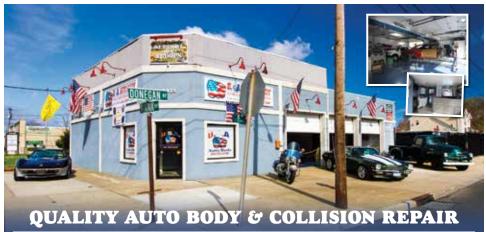


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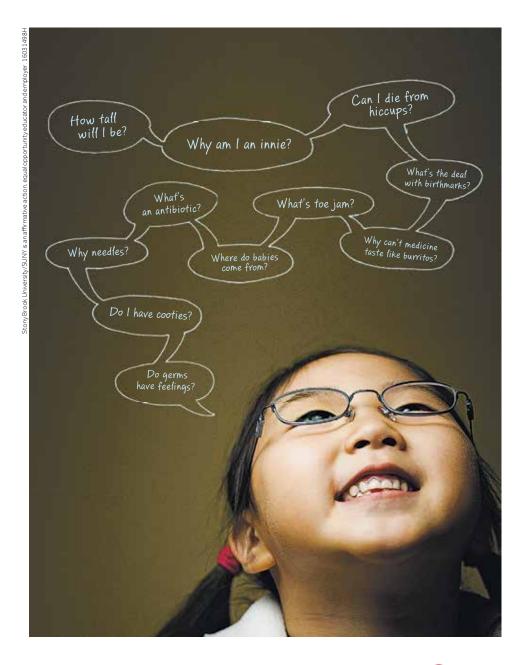
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
