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
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Letter from the Producers

elcome to Gateway Playhouse's 49th Season! We are very excited about the shows we have put together for you this summer.

Gateway has spent a busy year since The Odd Couple closed in October 1998. First, we were called in by the Village of Patchogue to advise them on the renovation of the Patchoque Theater. This was a tremendous challenge. The building had been erected in 1923 as a vaudeville house, renovated into a movie theater, and then stood derelict for some 15 years. Power had to be brought in, the roof reinforced to support the grid for lights and scenery, seats had to be purchased, sprinklers installed, the stage floor leveled - the list went on and on. After many long days of hard work it had a triumphant reopening in December and the first show to play there was our production of Nutcracker On Ice, a Christmas present to our patrons. We then brought Holiday Spectacular On Ice to the Patchague Theater, and we look forward to working in that theater again in the future.

Since January we have been busy with Gateway Candlewood International, our touring production company. This year we had four shows on the road simultaneously, from January to May, which really stretched the resources of our staff. They rose to the occasion and made it seem effortless.

This summer we are assembling the largest cast ever to appear on the Gateway stage for *Show Boat* (June 23 - July 25). 1776 (August 25 - September 11) is fresh from its Broadway revival. A Chorus Line (July 28 - August 21) is our touring production which traveled throughout Southeast Asia this winter. But the most exciting show for us is *Titanic* (September 15 - October 2). Gateway Playhouse is the first theater in the country to get the rights to mount this show since it closed this Spring on Broadway.

We are committed to presenting you with the best entertainment on Long Island; it is both our challenge and our pleasure to try to make each season better than the one before. Thank you for supporting Gateway Playhouse, and enjoy the show!

A History

n the early 1970s, two dancers, Tony Stevens and Michon Peacock, approached the legendary Broadway director Michael Bennett, wanting to explore the possibility of doing a show about dancers. He was intrigued, and arranged for about two dozen dancers, many of whom were performing in his show Seesaw, to dance and talk to him. about their lives in theater. There were two of these sessions, running from midnight when the shows ended, to about noon the next day, and both were recorded on audiotape.

Bennett edited the tapes with one of the dancers, Nicholas Dante, and then went to New York Shakespeare Festival and Public Theatre producer Joseph Papp, who liked the raw idea of a musical about auditioning, and set Bennett up with funds to workshop his project off-Broadway. Marvin Hamlisch and Ed Kleban began work on the music and lyrics, and James Kirkwood was brought in to work with Dante on the book. A Chorus Line was born at the Newman Theater (part of the Public Theatre's complex) in mid-April 1975. Critics were allowed to see the show on May 21, and after 101 performances it moved uptown to the Shubert Theater on Broadway.

Groundbreaking in its time, the show avoids using a narrative plot line and tells the individual stories of 18 dancers hoping to land a place in the chorus in a nameless musical. Asked probing questions by the director, they talk about their hopes, dreams childhoods, facing adversity, and coping with despair. This depiction of the universal struggle of the individual to be noticed apart from his group caught the public imagination, since nearly everyone knows the experience of standing in line hoping their interview will land them the job, and A Chorus Line was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1976. The show also won nine Tony Awards and ran for 15 years chalking up 6,137 performances. It was seen by more than six million people before it closed on April 28, 1990.

A film was made of the show in 1985, starring Michael Douglas and Terrence Mann, which was nominated for two Golden Globes and three Oscars. Two Broadway touring companies formed, one traveled seven years, and the other for five years and eight months. The show has been translated into dozens of languages and has been performed countless times around the world, including Gateway's tour this winter in Taiwan and Singapore.

irector Mitzi Hamilton and Musical Director Fran Liebergall have spent more than half their lives contemplating productions of A Chorus Line. Liebergall played the piano for the Off-Broadway workshop and was in the orchestra pit when the show moved uptown. Hamilton was in on the original taped interviews with Michael Bennett and was the inspiration for the character of Val. Hamilton did not get the part, however. "I remember auditioning with a airlfriend, but not reading any of my own material, I gave a bad audition, but luckily I was in *Pippin* at the time," she said. Instead, she opened in the London company of A Chorus Line and later went into the Broadway company when cast changes were made. "I left a few times, for other shows, but I always went

She went to a neighborhood dance school starting about age four. "By the time I was a teenager I began training more seriously and started playing roles in musical theater in school. In high school I knew I wanted to pursue it as a career." She stayed in her hometown of Chicago after graduation, working as a dancer, then worked in New York. She had landed the national tour of How to Succeed In Business when it came to Chicago and after it closed

Liebergall started taking piano lessons about age six with the same teacher till she was 18 when she attended Ithaca College. "I always wanted to be in a Broadway pit," she said. After college, she was offered a production of Jacques Brel and while doing that met the musical director of Godspell. "While I was

subbing for him I met Marvin Hamlisch. He had come to see Godspell and liked my playing. I auditioned for him and then for Michael Bennett and that's how I became the original pianist for A Chorus Line." She was 22 years old. Liebergall stayed in the pit with the show for about three years, then did Hamlisch's next show They're Playing Our Song for another three years. A Chorus Line drew her back as the supervisor for the New York company and touring companies. "I stayed with the show till it closed, but as supervisor I did not have to play in the pit, for rehearsals, casting, or working with understudies," she said, "and at the time my priority was my husband and son. It was comfortable." After her divorce she realized she needed her work to give her confidence, and her first musical direct-

ing job was, of course, A Chorus Line, the 1996 Equity tour.

About nine years ago. Hamilton began assistina directors while performing the role of Sheila in Europe. "I had no idea that I would be doing this now, it fell into my lap," she said. When a director she had been working with fell ill, she was given the opportunity to direct and choreograph the show herself. "I took myself off the stage the following year, this was more challenging and I had lost my desire to perform." she souid. although she still takes dance class.

"It is about passing it on to new young dancers, and watching them make it their own," said Hamilton, "It is very universal,

everyone has gone through the pains of growing up, and everyone has been on the line at some point so to speak." It is even more personal for Liebergall: thanks to A Chorus Line she met her ex-husband "Because of this show, I have my son. It led to my working with Mitzi. If it weren't for A Chorus Line my life would be so different," she said. In the last four years, Hamilton and Liebergall have done at least five productions together. "We've known each other for over 20 years, and there is such mutual respect," said Liebergall.

The two have just finished a production of *Grease* at The Muny in St. Louis, but *A Chorus Line* remains their first love. "No matter where it is done, the show is the star," Hamilton said. Liebergall adds, "She really loves this show, and so do I."

38 YEARS AGO AT GATEWAY...

Columbia Pictures Talent Farm



In 1961, realizing that there was no place in Hollywood to train young actors, Columbia Pictures talent director Joyce Selznick began hunting for a place to use as a "farm." A niece of the famed producer David O. Selznick, she had already discovered Tony Curtis when she began her trek around the country. 8000 miles later, she decided that Gateway Playhouse was the only place to look for young talent, making it the only summer theater and school affiliated with a major film studio.

At the time, the Main Stage theater had not been built, nevertheless, there were seven shows in rehearsal or performance at one time. An Equity company of six was in residence, and used the Barn Theater which also showcased children's theater productions, and 30 apprentices and 30 students used another theater on the grounds and put on a weekly show at the now-defunct Showcase Theater in Bellport village.


The apprentices lived on Gateway's grounds where they learned everything about theater from makeup application to set design. As David Sheldon, current producer Paul Allan's uncle, told

Newsweek that year, "In a great many theaters today, apprentices just perform lackey work. They cut lawns or wait tables, but don't get to act." At Gateway, they got to act, since Sheldon's father Harry Pomeran, began Gateway Playhouse specifically to focus on young people who ardently wanted to learn acting.

Due to Joyce Selznick, the Playhouse program attracted even more young people to act in summer stock in the hope of being discovered. Besides Columbia's representatives, other movie studios, agents, Broadway and TV producers would turn up in the audience to inspect Gateway's latest crop of hopefuls, and offered contracts and screen tests. Those chosen by Columbia Pictures studied with legendary teachers like Herbert Berghod and Uta Hagen in New York City. Lecturers and guest artists at Gateway included John Carradine, Lillian Roth, Bill Hayes and Lynda Day. James Darren, later described as a Selznick discovery, was an apprentice.

The school supported the theater, and as Sheldon said, "the theater supports the school because it attracts the students." Gateway also staged productions of new plays, giving young playwrights a crack at production as well.

Summer stock has now gone the way of the dinosaur, as audience expectations and production costs soared, making so many shows at one time impossible, But Harry Pomeran's vision of a place where young actors could develop their skills still remains in the Barn Theater, where his granddaughter Robin Allan holds classes for Gateway's Acting School.

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Spotlight on

hat would a musical be without dance?

Dance starts with a choreographer, who must visualize the characters, the place, the situation, and the reason for the dance. What elements will tell the story? Which character should have the focus? Should the set or props be incorporated? What about the lighting? How can the costumes and shoes help enhance the steps? The choreographer also must keep the dances relevant to the plot and the style of the musical - no classical ballet interludes in Grease! "I think there must be a continuation of the story, even the chorus is playing characters in the play," said Mitzi Hamilton, A Chorus Line's director/choreogra-

pher. Once the chohas reographer designed the dances, he or she must break down how many dancers are needed and what qualifications they must have for auditions. The age, build, height, and character type must be considered, as well as whether or not they also will sing. The choreographer puts together a combination of dance steps representative of the show's dances which will be taught to all those auditioning. This helps the choreographer determine how quickly the dancers learn in addition to how well they perform. In a theater like Gateway, the choreographer has about 12 days to work with the dancers before opening.

For rehearsals, a chalk or tape outline of the set is made on the floor in the rehearsal studio. Once in rehearsal, the choreographer has to teach the dancers

the dances he or she has created. "There are many ways of doing this," said Hamilton, "I like to be flexible with it so it can turn into a collaboration with the dancers." Dancers learn the movements in chunks, "marking" the steps by moving through them slowly. The tempo is gradually sped up, and music is added. At each rehearsal the dancers review the dances already learned, sometimes an assistant to the choreographer is responsible for this. Once the steps are down

> cold, the dancers polish the piece, working on the emotions they are expected to convey in the dance. Some choreographers use videotape at this stage to study for changes, or to keep as a permanent record of their work.

Finally, dancers rehearse in their costumes on the set. There is a world of difference between dancing in rehearsal clothes and in a period dress,

just as there is a difference between the taped outline, which is only two dimensional, and the actual set which has three.

Once the show opens, the director/choreographer is usually off working on another project but leaves behind a Dance Captain in charge. The Dance Captain must be a strong dancer, as he or she maintains the integrity of the dance as the run continues. "Things get loose and dancers forget, and he's that drill sergeant," explained Hamilton, "It is important that it is left in the hands of someone who can handle it."

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Theatre Etiquette

We were here, where were you?

Arriving late to the theatre is never considered "fashionably late." Please arrive before the scheduled curtain time to allow time to park and get to your seats before the show begins. After the performance or overture has begun, latecomers will be asked to wait until a suitable moment before being seated. The same reminder applies at intermission, so don't "dawdle."

Is this seat taken?

Please sit only in your assigned seats and remove any hats or accessories that may interfere with the vision of the person sitting behind you.

Talking & humming

Please don't. Kindly refrain from talking, humming or singing along during the show so as not to disturb your neighbors.

Hearing a pin drop

Just as you mentally leave your earthly boundaries and are transported to another place and time, becoming one with the performers, SUDDENLY, your neighbor starts beeping or unwrapping a candy. Watches, cellular phones and beepers are distracting and annoying to everyone. We ask that all such devices be left in the car or turned off upon your entry into the theatre. And why not pop that candy into your mouth before the show starts?

Running Ovations
