he Great War had ended less than five years before, and postwar depression had given way to an atmosphere of prosperity. Singer Hank Williams was born, actress Sarah Berhardt died, as did President

Warren G. Harding who was succeeded by Calvin Coolidge. Howard Carter was in Egypt, excavating the tomb of Tutankhamen. which he had discovered the previous November. It was 1923. F. Scott Fitzgerald was the most popular author, Flappers were in fashion, and in Patchogue, a new theater was born.


On Wednesday, May 23, 1923 Mike Glynne, a theatrical entrepreneur, opened a new theater to rival any on Long Island. Named after himself and his late partner Joseph Ward, Ward and Glynne's Patchogue Theatre was "palatial" and "magnificent in its interior decorations and appointments." It boasted a state-of-the-art geothermal air cooling system "whereby cool, fresh air will be rushed

into the theater from the floor line by fan drivers and sucked out at the ceiling line by four, seven foot typhoon fans above the ceiling." With over 200 square feet of ventilators this provided a complete change of air every five minutes.

A marvel for its time.

Ward & Glynne's PATCHOQUE THEATRE With a seating capacity of almost 1500, the theater showed silent movies with a glittering array of the biggest stars of the day including Pola Negri, Gloria Swanson, Betty Compson, Rudolf Valentino, Buddy Rogers and all the Barrymores. Thomas Meighan, the star of the opening night movie "The Ne'er Do Well" attended the opening of the theater along with Charles Scwab, a friend and supporter of Mr. Glynne's. The theater also attracted the best acts of vaudeville. Hand picked by Mr. Glynne were such acts as John Phillip Sousa, Paul Whiteman, and Eddie Foy and the Seven Little Foys. But by the 1930's vaudeville was dead. People now wanted to see the

"talkies" which were



being churned out of Hollywood at an incredible rate. The Ward and Glynne became strictly a movie palace.

In 1929 the theatre was sold to Prudential Theatre Circuit and it remained a movie theater for the next forty plus years, but time was not kind. In 1958 a fire destroyed the lobby and it was rebuilt along smaller lines and several store fronts were added to the front of the building. In 1980 United Artists bought the building. Multiplexes were the rage, and the Patchogue Theater was split into a triplex, destroying its interior. Plaster columns were smashed, sheetrock and wallpaper were installed, and ceilings were dropped. Unfortunately, the theater failed a few years later and stood empty, forlorn and derelict until last year.

In 1997 the Patchogue Village Board, headed by Mayor Steve Keegan, bought the theater and applied for grants to renovate and restore the building to its former glory. A new lobby was designed by New York Design Studios featuring a mahogany bar and Art Deco style bathrooms. Meanwhile, Mayor Keegan approached Gateway Playhouse producers Paul Allan and John Hodge about the project and they came on board as theatrical consultants.

Since the Village envisioned a Performing Arts Center, construction was begun to address modern theatrical requirements. The building was repointed and brick walkways to the parking lot were built. 2500 feet of conduit were installed beneath the floor to bring 2000 amps into the building. 60,000 pounds of steel were installed on the stage to be able to support up to 17 tons of lighting and scenery in the air. The building had to be reinforced to accommodate this and supporting columns were installed. 1000 period seats were obtained from Manhattan's Imperial Theater.

In the winter of 1998, following the completion of the new grid and fly system, Gateway produced a holiday show, *Nutcracker On Ice*. The show was a resounding success. Meanwhile, Gateway Playhouse producers Paul Allan and John Hodge were looking for a second venue in addition to their Bellport playhouse in order to expand their business to a

This summer their bid was accepted and Gateway was selected to run the theater for the Village on a five-year lease.

In August of this year the next phase of construction began. Chet Mitrani a fourth generation plasterer from Center Moriches, restored and repaired the plaster work on the auditorium walls, tapestry "The Theatre Classic of Long Island"

wall fabric was installed and an antique chandelier obtained from California. The seats were repaired, repainted and recovered. A 5,000 square foot addition was built to accommodate extended wing space for larger, modern sets and new dressing rooms.

The renovation is ongoing; plaster still needs to be painted and gilded, and the dressing rooms need to be completed, but the former Ward And Glynne Theater is once again the jewel of downtown Patchogue.

With the Beatles topping all Millennium polls as the best musical group ever, what better way to ring in the New Year than with this incredibly versatile and prolific band? No, the real Beatles can never reunite, but Gateway Performing Arts is presenting the next best thing from December 28 - January 1 at Patchogue Theater: TWIST and SHOUT!

The show is a chronological history of the group featuring four musicians who impersonate John Lennon, McCartney, Ringo Starr and George Harrison surrounded by dancers whose costumes reflect the period, and video and slides projected on screens behind them. It was researching, compiling, filming and editing these visuals that were the hardest part. "It was like a big school history project that I had to finish in two weeks," said Rob Conover, who had been working for Gateway Playhouse in the early 90's building sets when producer Paul Allan asked him to put together the slides and video for the show in 1995.


to use in order to automate all the slides." explained Conover, "and at the same time I was shooting slides of Beatlemania collectibles, album covers, and newspaper accounts." The images were carefully chosen to reflect the songs being performed and to place the viewer in the right moment from the 1960's. "For example, during some of their early numbers like Can't Buy Me Love and She Loves You there are images of the screaming fans, and shots of memorabilia to indicate how popular they had become," said Conover. Live video of the musicians is also projected, and images flash across eleven television screens, three projection screens which were also set up to show slides, video clips or live video feed. Conover, who was born after the Beatles broke up, was restricted to using public domain materials, but managed to have several lucky breaks along the way. "I found an old blacklight poster saying "Love Is All You Need" at a yardsale right

"We had an old computer and slide

machine which I had to teach myself how

down the road from Gateway!" he said.

Fashion of the time is very important to place the viewer in the context of the songs and is reflected in costume changes for the musicians and dancers as well as in the choice of video and slides. Conover chose the 1960's icon Twiggy, perhaps the first supermodel, as an image for When I Saw



Conover had to work closely with the set designer and lighting designer to achieve the emotional impact the images create on the audience. "I had to coordinate with the set designer how big the screens were and where they would be placed. Then the lighting designer and I worked together to make sure lights didn't hit the screens and wash them out," Conover said. Once the slides were shot and developed they were looked at on a light table to select which ones would be used. Each slide was then mounted on a heat-resistant glass slide mount, put in order, and coordinated with the number the musicians would be playing. Conover and the lighting designer then chose the palette for the number, taking into consideration the colors of the images and the costumes. The computer was then programmed to change the slides and video at the right time in the songs. "Luckily the musicians were incredibly consistent. It would be impossible to sit there and press a button every time one of these screens needed to change," said Conover.

The most difficult song for Conover to do was A Day In The Life because he selected images to illustrate the lyrics. "Some were literal like an alarm clock, a rooster,



and a comb for the first line. It went on and on like that, a lot of images very quickly. Finally it ends with this picture of a grand piano being dropped, to illustrate that big crashing chord. The timing has to be exact. That was the most fulfilling number for me," said Conover.

The show runs December 28 - January 1 at 7:30 p.m. with a special New Year's Eve performance available featuring hors d'oeuvres and a champagne toast at midnight during intermission. Stop by the box office for tickets and start the new Millennium with an old favorite, the Beatles!



SPOTLIGHT DN... JOLLY OLD SAINT NICK

The familiar image of Santa Claus as a jolly fat man in a red suit trimmed with white fur is an invention of North Americans of the 19th century, but it has its roots as far back as 4th century Europe.

Saint Nicholas was a Catholic bishop in the city of Myra in Asia Minor, and was buried in its cathedral. There are many stories about his charity, most of them apocryphal, such as the time he helped a poor family by throwing a bag of gold through their window. His feast day fell on December 6 until Pope Paul VI ordered him dropped from the official Roman Catholic calendar in 1969 because his life is so unreliably documented. Over the centuries, the concept of Saint Nicholas incorporated other pagan gift-givers such as the Roman Befana and the The modern Santa Claus as painted German Knecht Ruprecht, and gifts were traditionally exchanged in Europe on his feast day.

After the Reformation, German protestants encouraged the idea of the Christ Child as the gift giver on his feast day, December 25. Because the Saint Nicholas idea endured, it attached itself to December 25 as well. The German word for Christ Child, christkindl, was eventually corrupted into Kris Kringle. He is called Sinter Klaas in Holland where he is often depicted riding through the sky on a horse accompanied by an elf called Black Peter who whips naughty children.

The American version of Santa Claus came into this country through that legend of Sinter Klaas when Dutch settlers arrived in New York in the 17th century. He continued to wear a bishop's robes but added a pipe and a small sack of presents carried over the shoulder. In 1809 the legend gained widespread popularity when author Washington Irving published *The History Of New York* under the pseudonym Diedrich Knickerbocker. In 1823, with the publication of Clement Moore's famous poem 'Twas The Night Before Christmas, Santa Claus achieved most of the details we associate with him today including the names of his reindeer and the way he leaves a home by going up the chimney.

Santa got his North Pole workshop and list of good and bad children from illustrator Thomas Nast who drew Christmas issues for Harper's Magazine from the 1860s to 1880s. Abraham Lincoln specifically requested that Santa Claus visit Union soldiers in 1862

and Nast designed a fur-trimmed suit adorned with stars and stripes for the

occasion. Up until this point, Santa Claus is still depicted as the elf in Moore's poem, but in 1931 Coca-Cola introduced a fullsized Santa in the famous illustrations by Haddon Sundblom and published a new pose every year for 35 years. Rudolph, the red-nosed ninth reindeer, was invented in 1939 by an advertising writer for the Montgomery Ward Company.

Santa Claus remains an international figure today. He is called Pere Noel in France, the personification of "Noel" the festival of good news. In Switzerland he is accompanied by his wife, named Lucy, who distributes gifts to girls, while he gives gifts to boys. In Great Britain, he is called Father Christmas, wears a long red hooded robe trimmed with white fur and gets about on a white donkey. And in America, children set out cookies and milk as a snack for Santa and a carrot for the reindeer as their parents and grandparents did.


