Mr. Astin has performed Edgar Allan Poe-Once upon a midnight to critical acclaim and enthusiastic audiences in sitdown runs in several U.S. cities. This is his first tour of the play, which he hopes will help to enhance and deepen interest in and respect for Poe's brilliance and versatility. Astin said recently, "I feel that Poe, through his own tortured existence, gained deep insight into the nature of the universe, along with an intense love and appreciation for life itself. Through this play I want to share that impression with others."


Mr. Astin is, of course, best known as Gomez Addams, television's lovable, slightly crazed patriarch of the original Addams Family series, the myriad repeats of which have led to the frequent reference to Mr. Astin as a "pop-culture icon." Gomez remains one of his favorite TV characterizations, along with Buddy Ryan in Night Court and the title role in Evil Roy Slade.

Mr. Astin's early training was in Shakespeare and other classical dramatists. He appeared in the original New York companies of *The Threepenny Opera*, James Joyce's *Ulysses in Nighttown*, and Charles Laughton's memorable production of Shaw's *Major Barbara*. Other stage favorites include Fagin in *Oliver!*, Vladimir in *Waiting for Godot*, Sir Joseph in *H.M.S. Pinafore* (his most recent NY appearance), Henry Saunders in Ken Ludwig's *Lend Me a Tenor* and a highly praised characterization of Ebenezer Scrooge in Charles Dickens' classic *A Christmas Carol*.

Among Mr. Astin's films are West Side Story, That Touch of Mink with Doris Day and Cary Grant, The Wheeler Dealers, Move Over Darling, Candy, Viva Max, Pepper, Get to Know Your Rabbit, The Brothers O'Toole, and Freaky Friday, European Vacation, Nightlife, Gremlins II, Stepmonster, Huck & the King of Hearts, Peter Jackson's The Frighteners, and Betaville, (to be released in 1999) an adventure in the 21st century in which he portrays the President of the United States.

Mr. Astin received an Academy Award nomination for *Prelude*, a short film which he wrote, produced, and directed. He was nominated for an Ace Award for his work on *Tales From the Crypt*, and received an Emmy nomination for the cartoon voice of Gomez on ABC-TV's *The Addams Family*. His voice is popular on radio and in animation series. Mr. Astin served for four years on the Board of Directors of the Writers Guild of America West and is active in community affairs in Los Angeles and Santa Monica.

Mr. Astin was born in Baltimore and grew up in Washington, D. C. He received a degree in Drama from Johns Hopkins University and did his graduate work in English literature at the University of Minnesota. He resides in Los Angeles with his wife Valerie and is the father of five sons and one two-year-old granddaughter of whom he is intensely proud.



# Edgar Allan Toe Once upon a midnight

ALAN BERGMANN (Director) An Obie-Award winning actor, he played the title roles in Luther (National Co.), Macbeth (Stratford), and Danton's Death (Lincoln Center) among many Broadway shows. He began his directing career on television shows such as Barney Miller, Family Ties, Archie Bunker, and Night Court. He also directed a pilot for Warner Bros. entitled Dad, starring Martin Short. On stage, he directed Bernstein's Trouble in Tahiti, which won the LA Critics Award and How Do You Live with Love, the biggest hit in Theatre West's history. He recently directed Dream Girl at Room for Theatre, winning "Revival of the Year" from LA Weekly. Mr. Bergmann also directed and produced a short dramatic film based on Eudora Welty's story, The Hitch-Hikers, which won prizes at the New York, Chicago, and Dallas Film Festivals. Returning to acting, he played a major role in the feature film Turbulence and is currently on stage in Los Angeles, starring in Elephant Sighs.

PAUL DAY CLEMENS (Playwright) is co-author of The Actor's Book of Improvisation and has written several screenplays with longtime friend and collaborator Ron Magid. As an actor, he starred in the highly acclaimed television movie A Death in Canaan, and guest-starred in numerous television series. His film work includes co-starring

His most recent film work includes the leading role in Daybreak, an upcoming independent feature film. Mr. Clemens, a Poe scholar, appeared in a recent A & E Biography episode, The Mystery of Edgar Allan Poe, which also featured his own artwork. More than 20 years of passionate research into the life and works of Poe has culminated in the creation of Once Upon A Midnight.

RON MAGID (Playwright) evening is the result of a lifelong love for the stories and poems of E. A. Poe. But history has often provided the richest vein for Ron's theatrical talents. His first play, Dracula Tyrannus - the Tragical History of VIad the Impaler, won the Mrs. Anne Radcliffe Award for its original production at the Globe Playhouse. Ron is currently working on Poison Play, an examination of love, corruption and witchcraft in the court of Louis XIV. With Paul Day Clemens, he wrote Dominion, an action-adventure screenplay; The Manager, a psycho-comedy; and the supernatural thriller, Angels of Mercy. He also wrote 'The Butcher' episode of Friday the 13th - The Series. Ron serves as Special Effects Editor for American Cinematographer, and Cinescape magazines, and is currently writing Movie Magic episodes for The Discovery Channel.

IOHN BOESCHE (Scenery and Projections) is a former instructor of holography, laser sculpture and laser imaging at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. His designs for theater include scenery and projections for Tannhauser at Austin Lyric Opera, live video projections for the world premiere of John Adams' The Death of Klinghoffer, projected scenery for the Lyric Opera of Chicago productions of Tannhauser and The Voyage of Edgar Allan Poe, and projections for the world premiere of Dominic Argento's Valentino at Washington Opera. He designed projections for Emily Mann's Greensboro at the McCarter Theater, Henry IV, directed by Joanne Akalitis, at the New York Shakespeare Festival, On the Open Road, directed by Robert Falk at the Goodman Theater, Slaughterhouse Five, adapted and directed by Eric Simonsen at Steppenwolf Theatre, and Libra, adapted and directed by John Malkovich, at Steppenwolf Theatre, and the 50th anniversary production of The Glass Menagerie at Broadway's Roundabout Theatre.

IASON R. BEGHTOL (Lighting Designer) Mr. Beghtol was a Technical Theatre major at Fullerton College, and has worked as a Technical Director, audio and lighting designer, electrician, follow spot operator, rigging supervisor, and as a Stage and Set Construction consultant. He was Tech Director for the Dancing Waters show at the Disneyland Hotel, for The Pearson Park Amphitheater and for Medieval Times, Buena Park, California. He did the audio system and lighting design and installation for Life and Times-Old West Dinner Shows in Kanab, Utah.

ROB MILBURN and MICHAEL BODEEN (Sound Designers) have been creating music and sound for twenty years. From 1977 through 1984, Rob and Michael composed and performed with their band, Fugue, including the score for Chicago's Remains Theatre production of Tooth of Crime (Jeff Award-Original Music). Music collaborations include: My Thing of Love on Broadway at the Martin Beck Theatre: From The Mississippi Delta off-Broadway at circle in the Square-Downtown; All The Rage and Black Snow (Jeff Award-Original Music) at the Goodman Theatre; Slays!, Slaughterhouse Five. Time To Burn and sound design for A Clockwork Orange (Jeff Award-Sound Design) at Steppenwolf Theatre. Michael and Rob also create music and sound for CD-ROM titles and film.

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IT'S HERE AT LAST

he Great War had ended less than five years before, and postwar depression had given way to an atmosphere of prosperity. Singer Hank Williams was

born, actress Sarah Berhardt died, as did

President Warren G. Harding who was succeeded by Calvin Coolidge. Howard Carter was im Egypt, excavating the tomb of Tutankhamen, which he had discovered the previous November, It was 1923, E. Scott Fitzgerald was the most popular author, Flappers were in fashion, and in Patchogue, a new theater was born.

On Wednesday, May 23, 1923 Mike Glynne, a theatrical entrepreneur, opened a new theater to rival any on Long Island. Named after himself and his late partner Joseph Ward, Ward and Glynne's Patchogue Theatre was "palatial" and "magnificent in its interior decorations and appointments." It boasted a state-of-

the-art geothermal air cooling system "whereby cool, fresh air will be rushed into the theater from the floor line by fan drivers and sucked out at the ceiling line by four, seven foot typhoon

> fans above the ceiling." With over 200 square feet of ventilators this provided a complete change of air every five minutes. A marvel for its time.

With a seating capacity of almost 1500, the theater showed silent movies with a glittering array of the biggest stars of the day including Pola Negri, Gloria Swanson, Betty Compson, Rudolf Valentino, Buddy Rogers and all the Barrymores. Thomas Meighan, the star of the opening night movie "The Ne'er Do Well" attended the opening of the theater along with Charles Scwab, a friend and supporter of Mr. Glynne's. The theater also attracted the best acts of BIG VAUDEVILLE PROGRAM vaudeville. Hand picked by

Mr. Glynne were such acts as John Phillip Sousa, Paul

Opening Weekend Bill in 1923

Whiteman, and Eddie Foy and the Seven Little Foys. But by the 1930's vaudeville was dead. People now wanted to see the "talkies" which were being churned out of Hollywood at an incredible rate. The Ward and Glynne became strictly a movie palace.

In 1929 the theatre was sold to Prudential Theatre Circuit and it remained a movie theater for the next forty plus years, but time was not kind. In 1958 a fire destroyed the lobby and it was rebuilt along smaller lines and several store fronts were added to the front of the building. In 1980 United Artists bought the building. Multiplexes were the rage, and the Patchogue Theater was split into a triplex, destroying its interior. Plaster columns were smashed, sheetrock and wallpaper were installed, and ceilings were dropped. Unfortunately, the theater failed a few years later and stood empty, forlorn and derelict until last year.

In 1997 the Patchogue Village Board, headed by Mayor Steve Keegan, bought the theater and applied for grants to renovate and restore the building to its former glory. A new lobby was designed by New York Design Studios featuring a mahogany bar and Art Deco style bathrooms. Meanwhile, Mayor Keegan approached Gateway Playhouse producers Paul Allan and John Hodge about the project and they came on board as theatrical consultants.

Since the Village envisioned a Performing Arts Center, construction was begun to address modern theatrical requirements. The building was repointed and brick walkways to the parking lot were built. 2500 feet of conduit were installed beneath the floor to bring 2000 amps into the building. 60,000 pounds of steel were installed on the stage to be able to support up to 17 tons of lighting and scenery in the air. The building had to be reinforced to accommodate this and supporting columns were installed. 1000 period seats were obtained from Manhattan's Imperial Theater.

In the winter of 1998, following the completion of the new grid and fly system, Gateway produced a holiday show, Nutcracker On Ice. The show was a resounding success. Meanwhile, Gateway Playhouse producers Paul

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
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

Allan and John Hodge were looking for a second venue in addition to their Bellport playhouse in order to expand their business to a year round operation. Recognizing the potential of the new theater, Allan and Hodge submitted a bid to become the operators of the venue. This summer their bid was accepted and Gateway was selected to run the theater for the Village on a five-year

"The Theatre Classic of Long Island" WARD and GLYNNE'S Wednesday Evening 

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In August of this year the next phase of construction began. Chet

Mitrani a fourth generation plasterer from Center Moriches, restored and repaired the plaster work on the auditorium walls, tapestry wall fabric was installed and an antique chandelier obtained from California. The seats were repaired, repainted and recovered. A 5,000 square foot addition was built to accommodate extended wing space for larger, modern sets and new dressing rooms.

The renovation is ongoing; plaster still needs to be painted and gilded, and the dressing rooms need to be completed, but the former Ward And Glynne Theater is once again the jewel of downtown Patchogue.
