


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


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fl Note From the Producers



This year marks Gateway Playhouse's 50th anniversary and the start of a new millennium. We're proud of our history and excited about our future.

We open our season with an old favorite that has a new twist - Pippin, the story of a young man's search for the meaning of his life, with a new ending and a new twist added by Stephen Schwartz, and dazzling Bob Fosse-style choreography.

Following Pippin is The Best Little Whorehouse In Texas, a rollicking political satire recounting the rise and fall of the Chicken Ranch, a Texas pleasure palace. It is directed by Phillip George, who grew up near the real Chicken Ranch, and who has directed the Forbidden Broadway spoofs in Manhattan.

The world premiere of Yankee Doodle Dandy brings us into July. This new musical about the life of the legendary Long Islander, George M. Cohan, will have audiences singing along to "Give My Regards to Broadway" and "You're a Grand Old Flag". We're planning a special performance for Independence Day!

South Pacific, the classic Rodgers and Hammerstein love story will sweep you off to an island paradise this summer. This show features some of the most beautiful music ever written for the stage, including "Some Enchanted Evening" and "Younger Than Springtime".

The ideal family musical Big is too big for Gateway Playhouse, so we are staging it in The Patchogue Theatre For The Performing Arts beginning August 9th. Based on the hit Tom Hanks movie, this story about a boy who gets his wish to become big, is fluny, insightful, and touching. It will recapture the feeling of falling in love for the first time.

Finally, we bring you The Will Rogers Follies, a combination of homespun wit, beautiful showgirls, burlesque, vaudeville, and a fabulous score encompassing jazz, country, blues, and rock. This production in Bellport kieks off our exciting National tour.

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Featured Priisi... Peggy Pope

Peggy Pope (Berthe) decided to be an actress while in high school, for therapeutic reasons: "I was unbelievably shy, and I thought if I could be an actress, that might help!" She wanted to start right away, but her mother asked her to earn her degree at Smith College first, so she'd have something to fall back on. "I had an image of walking into an office one day, throwing my diploma in the air and falling back on it," she said, "but I never had to do that, I was

very lucky."

She has been lucky, although being talented had a great deal to do with it as well. She has shared the stage with Jimmy Stewart and Helen Hayes in *Harvey*, won an Obie for portraying the hooker Evelyn Landis, whose specialty was chinese basket jobs, in John Guare's *Muzeeka*, played a foul mouthed librarian in the movie *The Substitute* and a lush in 9 To 5, and was featured on the television series, *Soap*, *Bewitched* and *Barney Miller*. She's done stand-up at The New York Comedy Club and cabaret at Don't Tell Mama.

The live stage is her favorite medium, though. "My first job was a play called Mr. Roberts, produced by Leland Hayward, and I was the only woman on tour with a male cast, so that was a trial by fire," she said.


When she got to Broadway in *Harvey*, she was so nervous she dropped a calling card handed her by Jimmy Stewart not once, but twice! He picked it up both times. "I thought it was the end of the world, but the audience thought it was part of the business! I loved being in that show. He was so real, he never changed from off stage to on stage," she remembered.

"I went to California to do television so I could get better parts in New York on the stage. I was going to stay five years, but I stayed fifteen," she said. Working on *Soap* was the next best thing to being in theater, since it was filmed before a live audience, although the tiny delay between delivering a joke and audience reaction took some getting used to. "They have monitors which are easier for the audience to watch because the cameras are in the way," she explained, "so there is a small fraction of time delay which is very odd. You have to make an adjustment."

Pope's biggest adventure was performing at The Festival Of Two Worlds in Spoleto, Italy. "There was no Equity contract, so I thought I'd go early and look around. A month later Gian Carlo Menotti, who was running it, told me 'we're not doing that show' because they couldn't raise the money for it. I had spent all my money! He was wonderful and told me he had a trunkful of plays. We ended up doing a Jules Feiffer comedy, which no one understood a word of, so no laughs for two weeks!"

Her favorite role was Madame Arcati in *Blithe Spirit*. "That was the best role I ever had, she is so possessed and determined, but both times I played her we never had enough rehearsal. And the most fun I had was Mrs. Peachum in *Three Penny Opera*. She was so low class!"

Pope's latest venture is writing short stories. She was accepted to The Writer's Workshop in Iowa, but unfortunately it coincided with *Pippin* and she chose to do the show. "I can keep writing without a workshop, but I can't do *Pippin* without a show," she said, "The thing about a musical is, no matter what mood you are in, the minute the overture starts, you feel great!"

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Gateway Playhouse at 50

Charting new territory



Gateway Playhouse turns 50 this season, and while the outside of the theater may look the same as ever, inside the theater and backstage, things have changed a great deal. Now, contemplating its history and looking ahead to the new Millennium, Gateway's staff find themselves in something of a transitional period as they develop their business and chart new territory.

Producing professional theater on Long Island has its challenges, and not just on the artistic end. The first challenge being the ever evolving face of musical theater on Broadway. Technical innovations in recent Broadway successes like Titanic, The Lion King, Miss Saigon and Contact, to name a few, have audiences expecting more than before. In order to present these shows as they were intended, Gateway has had to raise the bar to keep up. All technical aspects of these shows cost a great deal to duplicate, even on a smaller scale. Just about all the unions are represented now," explained Producer Paul Allan, "we use Broadway sets, Broadway actors, Broadway musicians, Broadway directors and designers. This costs more, but our customers know Gateway is the only place they can see a show of this cal-




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
The move to the new 500 seat main stage in 1962 allowed the staging of larger musicals like "The Music Man" above.

iber other than in New York City. We're thrilled that, even with all of the Broadway performers and production values, we're still able to keep our ticket prices at about onethird of Broadway prices."

Which brings us to the next challenge, which is the environment that Suffolk and Nassau County provides for theater. We are a professional theater competing in a community theater market basically," continues Allan, "with several amateur theater groups cropping up in the last decade or so, we have to continue to set ourselves apart." This involves casting quality performers. Robin Joy Allan, Gateway's casting director spoke of the differences now, as compared to the days when she and her brother Paul were "growing up" at Gateway. "When our grandfather was hiring a company in the 1960s, he jobbed in a few leads from Manhattan, and the rest of the company were apprentices,

young people learning their craft. That grew into a hired ensemble during the late 1970s and into the mid 1980s, with a resident company covering all the various roles throughout the season. Now, according to Allan, she painstakingly looks through hundreds of agent submissions per show and attends many auditions in the city to find people uniquely suited for each role: type, age, physicality (look), vocal requirements, specific talents and specialties. "These are all working actors who attend auditions on a daily basis and perform at all Equity affiliated theaters across the country as well as in Broadway National Tours and on Broadway itself. The talent pool is vast, and that is why we can replicate Broadway productions without sacrificing the integrity of the original creators intent."

Hodge, are looking ahead to expanding beyond Bellport and the new Patchogue Theater. "With all the know-how we have amassed over the years, our top notch staff, and the larger stage and wing space at Patchogue, we have the capability to become a birthing place for new Broadway shows. We are considering presenting straight plays in the winter and showing art and independent films in Patchogue, but that is after we settle into a routine. For now, we need to concentrate on maintaining our production values, our touring and set rental business, and building our customer base for Patchogue."



As musicals got bigger and more complicated Gateway was able to adapt and handle the challenges, as with "Tommy," above in '96 and "A Chorus Line," below in '99.

The more things change,

however, the more they stay the same. Paul's family always took part in every aspect of the business, performing, designing, directing, painting flats, selling tickets, ordering lumber, as well as fixing leaky toilets and broken windows on the large old estate. Speaking of his partner John, Paul said "we've both done all the jobs as well, it equips us for each



day and helps us see the process from all sides." As he ran off to a PIPPIN production meeting with the heads of all the various departments, he concluded, "It all comes down to what the audience sees on the stage and our fiftieth year should be a culmination of what a Gateway season has always been, an inspired undertaking, a striving for excellence and a great summer of entertainment."

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
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
