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
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
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# A LETTER FROM THE PRODUCER

2002 finds us continuing to provide quality musical theater to Long Island, a tradition that has endured for more than 50 years. We have seen times and tastes change and we have adapted and grown to satisfy them, producing new releases from Broadway while still including beloved classics. In keeping with this custom, we're offering two unforgettable favorites, three Long Island premieres, and the re-conception of a landmark musical. We opened with Fiddler On The Roof, a show whose theme of tradition, which speaks to all races and religions, is more relevant today than ever before. We now lighten things up with Forbidden Broadway, a hilarious parody lampooning the stars and showmen of the Great White Way. Next we will present the Long Island premiere of Ragtime, a romantic, mesmerizing show recalling the turn of the 20th Century, at the Patchogue Theatre. Back in Bellport, we offer fun for the whole family with Annie Get Your Gun, the true story of the American legend Annie Oakley, with great songs by another American legend, Irving Berlin. Then we are back in Patchogue with Jesus Christ Superstar, the show that introduced rock opera and Andrew Lloyd Webber to American audiences, newly reconceived for a contemporary sensibility. Finally, we present Swing! (sponsored in part by Project Liberty) a dazzling revue showcasing the uniquely American form of music and dance popularized in the 1940's which has recently made a comeback. In these uncertain and changing times, it is critically important to support the performing arts, and we thank our patrons for their loyalty over the years. We welcome those of you experiencing your first Gateway show and hope you will continue joining us, creating your own tradition, as we keep bringing professional musical theater to Long Island.

Currently, Eric can be seen in the Off-Broadway smash interactive comedy, Tony and Tina's Wedding, celebrating its 14th year of holy-moly matrimony. In his "free time", Eric plays the bass and back-up vocals for his rock band, Synthetic 16. # THE FORBIDDEN BROADWAY STORY

n 1981, Gerard Alessandrini had just come to New York from a small town in Massachusetts to break into show business. Like a lot of Broadway hopefuls, he went to auditions during the day, tried to see all the shows, and waited tables at night. "He made notes making fun of all the shows he'd seen for the amusement of the busboys and the other waiters, when they were on a break he'd sing them for them," said Phil George, Gateway's director for *Forbidden Broadway* and the co-director with Alessandrini of the current Broadway version. "His boss finally caught him, threw the drawerful of lyrics in the garbage and fired him. A friend of Gerard's ran after him with the napkins in his hand and said, this is a good idea, you should do this for a show!"

Alessandrini took the advice, and put the parodies together as a cabaret act for himself and his girlfriend Nora. The show opened in 1982 at Palssons' Supper Club in New York City. Eventually, they hired two more people to entertain the audience while he and Nora changed costumes, and as the show grew, they were adapted into it as full cast members. "The show was never produced, it just happened," said George, "and word started getting out on the street that it was really funny, and the next thing they knew they were this Off-Broadway show. It was like the ultimate 'Mickey and Judy' show. It was supposed to be just three nights at Palssons'."

George got involved when other productions began opening in other cities. "I was cast in 1987 in the Boston production," he said, "and almost from the very get-go I started being the defacto choreographer. The show was getting bigger and bigger in its production values. Whenever there was a little dance, I would stage it and then that just grew. I went from being the choreographer to the director. The show had never been directed, Gerard was not a director, he was a writer." George has been directing the show ever since. "The fact that it evolves is why it keeps me interested. And we are not a big Broadway show. We can do anything we want to when we decide to, that night. We can just say, let's do this tonight, ten minutes before curtain," he explained.

There have been 16 editions, touring companies, and shows in London, Los Angeles, Toronto, Hong Kong, Jerusalem, and other cities. "The thing about *Forbidden Broadway* is that even if you don't understand the reference, the numbers are still entertaining. You really don't have to know Broadway to think it's funny," said George, "In New York we get a little more inside, but when we take the show out on the road, we make it more general. Everyone knows *Man Of La Mancha* or *West Side Story.* And if you don't like the number you are seeing, four minutes later you will!"

The show changes as Broadway shows come and go, and as people's awareness of what Broadway is, changes. "We have had to learn to write for a younger generation," said George, "which is hard to do because they don't share your same cultural baggage. It's hard to tell jokes about things you don't value. And occasionally a number gets really old, and sometimes we're in denial about it but eventually we'll say we have to pull the plug."

"Above everything else, the show is a showcase for the four actors," said George, "You really have to cast four great people that you think can hold the stage, who should be stars if they are not already! A lot of people left our show for bigger things. Brad Oscar is playing the lead in *The Producers* right now. Jason Alexander went on to do *Seinfeld*. Felicia Finley was just taken out for a lead in *Aida*. We are always developing talent so it can be stolen! The critics have written about numbers they didn't like, but in the 17 years I've been doing it I don't remember anyone ever criticizing a member of the cast."

George also remains involved with the show because he simply can't bear to leave it. "For some of us, it's an addiction, it's like 'I can't leave Forbidden Broadway, because if I left Forbidden Broadway, then I wouldn't get to do Forbidden Broadway anymore.' It's been in my life so long now, I guess I take it a little for granted, but I love it with my whole soul, and I know it will destroy me when it closes someday. I can't imagine my life without it, and I have to be there for the end of the story." With the current Broadway version winning the 2001 Drama Desk Award for Best Musical Revue, it seems the end of the story is still a long way off.



TONY WICHOWSKI (Understudy) recently played Father on the national tour of Ragtime. Favorite roles include Julian Marsh (42nd Street), Colonel Ricci (Passion), and Harold Hill (The Music Man). Choral credits include Haydn The Creation, Brahms Liebeslieder Waltzer and Durufle Requiem all at Carnegie Hall. Tony has a BA in Music from California State University Chico.

PAUL ALLAN (Producer) Forbidden Broadway marks Paul's 135th production at this theater. Having grown up in the theatrical family that started Gateway, Paul has been involved in theater from an early age. In addition to his work here, Paul cofounded a successful touring company mounting over 23 productions in countries as far away as Taiwan and Korea. He even spent some time "on the road" driving the rigs that haul the scenery and props, and as Technical Director. Paul has also been the show carpenter for several off-Broadway shows. Recently, Paul acted as consultant and advisor on the restoration and renovation of the Patchogue Theatre, which, under Gateway's control, reopened in 1998 with Nutcracker On Ice and was followed by over 150 shows, concerts, and other attractions. The venue is now under the control of Patchogue Village but Gateway still stages shows there several times each year, including Ragtime, coming July 10.

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PHILLIP GEORGE (Director) Past Gateway productions include Footloose, The Best Little Whore House In Texas. As a director, his credits include 12 editions of the infamous Forbidden Broadway revue in New York, as well as Chicago, London, Los Angeles and the National Tour. The most recent edition Forbidden Broadway 2001 won a Drama Desk Award for Best Musical Revue and was recorded by DRG Records. The London edition of Forbidden Broadway recently transferred from the Jermyn Street Theatre to the Albery Theatre in the West End. He directed Forbidden Hollywood both in New York and Los Angeles and continues to work on its various incarnations. In 1993 he collaborated with Howard Crabtree and others on Whoop-Dee-Doo, directing both the acclaimed New York and London productions. He also was the Associate Director to Mark Waldrop on When Pigs Fly at the Douglas Fairbanks. With David Lowenstein he created and directed Shout, which recently played in London at the Jermyn Street Theatre. He has directed performers at La Mama, PS 122, HERE & NADA. Other U.S. directing credits include The Capitol Steps, Return to the Forbidden Planet, Philemon, The Roar of the Greasepaint, and A Doctor In Spite of Himself. A resident director at the King's Head Theatre in London, his work includes Kean, Much Revue About Nothing, The Famous Five, The Arcadians, and Frankly, Scarlett, which he also coauthored with his long-time collaborator and best buddy, Peter Morris. He teaches at AMDA, directs the occasional club act and is the Artistic Director of The Musical Comedy Factory, which produces new musicals on a small scale.

ROBERT FELSTEIN (Musical Director) has music directed over forty professional productions, including Pippin here at Gateway two seasons ago. He has written

music for several new works, most recently Working Girls (with his wife, Debbie Lee Iones), which was developed at Ensemble Studio Theatre. He is the music director and pianist for Bravo On With the Show, a three year project featuring Broadway performers giving workshops for teens in all fifty states around the country, which is being filmed for Bravo TV. As a pianist, Robert is active as a rehearsal pianist on and off-Broadway, as well as a cabaret pianist. He is a vocal coach on the faculty of the Hartt School of the University of Hartford.

ROBIN IOY ALLAN (Artistic Director) has been immersed in "show biz" all her life, performing, musical directing, teaching, directing and producing. In 1985 she began her casting career in New York and then moved on to Los Angeles, where she cast numerous TV Pilots, MOW's and Features. Highlights..... working with Ron Howard, Rob Reiner, Jerry Zucker, and Chris Carter (pre-X-Files!) on several projects as Associate and Casting Director, including: Parenthood; When Harry Met Sally; and Ghost. Upon returning to the East Coast, she began to lend her artistic vision to the productions at Gateway and has reinstated Gateway's Acting School Division in which she trains the advanced students and prepares them for higher education and professional careers. All this keeps her pretty busy, although her most rewarding time spent is with her beautiful daughter, Hayley Lynn.

**KRAUS** (Production Stage Manager) is thrilled to be back at the Gateway for the fourth season. She is a graduate from Emerson College, where she received a BFA in Production Stage Management. Some of her favorite credits include Pippin, The Will Rogers Follies, West Side Story, and Funny Girl. Erin would like to thank everyone at the

Gateway Playhouse for all their support over the last few years. She would also like to thank Mom, Dad, and Brigid for their love and inspiration.

MICHAEL BOYER (set designer/technical director) Mike's first production at Gateway Playhouse was They're Playing Our Song in 1983. This summer marks his return after a three year hiatus. This season he will be designing Fiddler On The Roof and Forbidden Broadway. Mike has designed 67 productions at Gateway Playhouse, not counting numerous Children's Theatre productions. He is a member of Actors' Equity Association and United Scenic Artists, Local 829. For the past fourteen years whenever Mike has not been at Gateway, he has worked as set designer/technical director for the Tennessee Williams Fine Arts Center in Key West, Florida. ALVIN COLT (Costume Designer) Alvin Colt's costumes have been represented in 76 Broadway shows which include the original productions of On The Town and Guys and Dolls, plus Li'l Abner, Fanny, Destry Rides Again, Sugar, Pipe Dream, Wildcat, Lorelei, Greenwillow and numerous others. A Tony Award-winner, he has been nominated four times and is a four-time nominee for television's Emmy Award, having designed costumes for over 90 productions on all major networks.

MARCIA MADEIRA (Lighting Designer) previously designed Footloose, West Side Story, The Will Rogers Follies and The Wizard of Oz for Gateway. She received a Tony nomination and won the Drama Desk Award for Nine. Other Broadway designs include My One and Only with Tommy

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


