
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The Dust of Life

In Miss Saigon, Kim grabs her only chance to ensure that her son accompanies his American father to the United States where he would have a better life than remaining in postwar Vietnam where Amerasian children were shunned as Bui Doi, meaning "the dust of life". In a culture where family is the center of everyday life and ancestors are worshipped, Kim knows her bui doi son faces a dismal, hopeless future.

When South Vietnam began to fall in April 1975, efforts were made to remove as many children from the country as possible. Claude-Michel Schonberg was inspired to write Miss Saigon by the photo accompanying this story, depicting a Vietnamese mother sending her daughter to the U.S. with no hope of ever seeing her again. As the Vietcong advanced on Saigon, Buddhist and Catholic nuns scrambled to gather orphans and bui doi, sending 2800 of

them almost overnight on cargo

planes around the world to

safe countries and adop-

tion, in a daring and

risky action.

Abandoned children who were not evacuated grew up in orphanages or with foster families where many were abused and treated as slaves. Bui doi were scorned and disparaged as fatherless children of the enemy, given little opportunity for education or employment, and prostitution, begging, peddling, or menial labor became the most common means of support. Vietnam had been a battlefield for centuries, resisting China and France long before American involvement, and the victorious Communist North Vietnamese had no qualms about ostracizing the offspring of the "capitalist" South Vietnamese and their American collaborators. The U.S. offered to accept them as refugees, but the new Vietnamese government denied discriminating against them, which was a requirement for refugee status. In response to reports of piracy and drownings as people tried to flee the country in boats, the Orderly Departure Act was negotiated in 1979 by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. Vietnamese who had relatives living abroad could now legally join them, of the bui doi who left under the Act most joined relatives who had successfully fled Vietnam, since they did not know who or where their American fathers were.

In the U.S. perception grew that the bui doi were America's "forgotten children", and the Amerasian Homecoming Act of 1984 was created specifically to permit them to enter the US; they had to provide proof of American paternity but did not have to name the father. Teams of physicians examined applicants for "American" physical features, an inexact and subjective method that wrongfully denied many Amerasians exit visas, especially if their fathers were Black or Hispanic. Even those who did emigrate faced a language barrier, strange customs, and a lack of marketable skills.

Some Amerasians lucky enough to escape Vietnam built successful lives for themselves in the U.S. Mary Xinh Nguyen was named Revlon's Most Unforgettable Woman. Tuan Van Le played football in the early '90's for Stanford. Kien Nguyen, who left Vietnam at 17 under the Orderly Departure Act, became a Manhattan dentist who authored The Unwanted, a harrowing memoir of his experience as a bui doi in postwar Vietnam. But those who never left Vietnam, now in their 30's, have



romanticized the relationship between their biological parents, idolize the fathers they never knew, and fantasize about reuniting with them. Most have no more than a first name or a battered photograph to go on, and although the U.S. government once again has established diplomatic relations with Vietnam, it is doubtful the dreams of these "children of dust" will ever be fulfilled.



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

The Evacuation of Saigon

The evacuation of Saigon in April 1975 was the largest airlift in history, moving over 50,000 people. Throughout March and into early April, 44 Naval vessels, 6000 Marines, 120 Air Force combat and tanker planes and 150 Naval planes were moved into the area while Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and the U.S. Ambassador in Saigon, Graham Martin, argued that withdrawing the American community would

touch off widespread panic and even accelerate the fall of the South Vietnamese government.

On April 3, a combination of private and military transport planes began the 30 flights of Operation Babylift – a \$2 million effort to remove orphans from embattled Saigon and send them to the US, Europe, Australia and Canada for adoption. Two or three babies were placed in an open box or woven basket, dozens of boxes then ran the length of the cargo plane floors. Nurses and embassy workers accom-

panied the flights to care for the children, many of which were sick, injured, or malnourished. Planes meant to carry 100 people contained three times as many. One Operation Babylift C-5A cargo plane experi-

enced depressurization, turned back and crash landed, killing 154 people, nearly half those aboard. With time of the essence, the crew quickly placed the surviving children aboard helicopters – one of these surviving children made the papers after her adoption by actor Yul Brynner. In the end, more than 3000 children were evacuated to safety in Operation Babylift.

Over eight days in mid-April, nearly

40,000 Americans and South Vietnamese refugees were evacuated by fixedwing aircraft from Tan Son Nhut airport just outside Saigon, as the shelling and rocket fire made the flights ever more dangerous. Finally, on April 28, the airport was closed. The following day, two Marines were killed and a C-130 cargo plane destroyed prompting President Ford to call an emergency meeting to discuss resuming a military airlift. Since commercial flight, military flights, and ships were no longer feasible, it was

decided to put "Option IV" called Operation Frequent Wind into play.

On April 29, when Armed Forces Radio broadcast the signal "I'm Dreaming Of A White Christmas," a fleet of 81 helicopters







embarked on the mission, landing two at a time in a tennis court near the defense attache's compound close to Tan Son Nhut airport where they unloaded 860 Marines to reinforce the 120 already in place, and pick up evacuees. They worked

throughout the day depositing the rescued onboard American aircraft carriers waiting offshore, but the embassy compound still had to be evacuated. The rain began falling so hard that pilots had to rely on Marines firing flares or waving flashlights in order to land. More Marines were holding back the desperate crowd trying to scale the ten-foot wall topped with barbed wire as others cleared the embassy floor by floor, withdrawing toward the roof with looters on their heels ransacking the abandoned offices. Finally, Ambassador Martin closed



down the embassy, destroyed its communications equipment, and boarded while Marines hurled teargas grenades into the elevator shafts. For three hours eleven remaining Marines waited for rescue and were planning a last stand when a Sea

Knight helicopter with two Cobra escorts returned to bring them to the USS Okinawa. As the Sea Knight flew along the Saigon River, the last Marines to leave Saigon could see Communist tanks about to enter the city.

Defense Department records show Operation Frequent Wind removed 1373 Americans and 5680 Vietnamese in less than 48 hours, far more than anticipated. Combined with 32,000 Vietnamese who reached the US ships by raft, sampan and rowboat, more than 70,000 people safely fled Vietnam in that one week.
