


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
A Letter from the Producer


We're glad you have come to enjoy our 54th season of bringing professional theatre to LI audiences. In our culture, live theatre must now compete with less expensive and more readily obtainable entertainment alternatives like reality TV, internet DVD rentals, and the latest summer blockbuster action movie. However, as anyone who saw last year's Miss Saigon or Phantom will attest, there is nothing like the thrill of being swept up in the drama of a live performance! We work hard to maintain high production values by utilizing the latest theatre technologies and employing only the highest caliber of actors - after days of grueling NYC auditions. Our directors, choreographers, designers, and musicians are all theatre professionals - each represented by their respective theatrical union. All this allows us the ability to produce shows on a scale unmatched by any other theatre on Long Island. Gateway's faithful patrons can be sure that we continually strive to keep the medium fresh with new takes on classic musicals, like this year's Carousel, Gypsy, and Cabaret, by casting non-traditional and nonstereotypical performers, and creating new set design and lighting concepts. Whenever possible, we obtain the rights to new pieces, and this year present the Long Island premiere of Cats and the rarely staged Swingtime Canteen, but we are most excited to be the first theatre in the nation to produce Fosse since Broadway and the national tours.

We encourage theatre lovers to bring their children to our main stage shows and have also scheduled a series of 6 shows specifically for children on Friday and Saturday mornings throughout the summer. The schedule can be found on the back page of this playbill.



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Kids on Stage - THE IMPORTANCE OF TRAINING

By the age of 8, Dainty June Hovick was headlining on the Orpheum circuit, a major star in vaudeville's fading firmament. Ten years later, she was reduced to marathon dancing to keep herself fed. She desperately wanted to be an actress, but she had no training or experience and no idea how to get them. As June said in her autobiography, "If I could only find out how to be who I'd like to be, I just knew I'd get to be, somehow."

Determination wasn't enough then, and it isn't enough now. "When you want to be a dancer, you take dance lessons, when you want to be a singer, you take voice lessons, many kids that want to be on Broadway think that singing and dancing is all that is required. In order to call yourself an actor, you need to study the art of acting. It is an art form just like any other. You need to train the heart, soul and mind to work together to be able to flesh out a character, to believe in your given situation, to listen and respond honestly to other characters under imaginary circumstances, to interpret playwright's intentions, to be comfortable showing your emotions and expressing feelings in front of other people. What happens when a movie or television career is desired? How does singing in Annie or dancing in a dance recital help you with that?" asked Robin Joy Allan, Gateway's Casting Director and Artistic Director. Ms. Allan, who spent years in Los Angeles casting films such as Parenthood, advises any parent who wants to see their child in show business to make sure the child is well rounded. "In L.A., singing and dancing is almost never needed," she said, "We looked for children who could act." And the same goes for Broadway - a great dancer or singer who has never learned to act will find it difficult to get agent representation.

When June Hovick was a child, the entertainment business was scorned, and if you wanted your children on stage, you did everything yourself from supplying costumes to making bookings, like her mother, Rose. Today, the business has become an industry, with agents specializing in children, or having large children's divisions. But it is the parent who must supervise the child's training. When it comes to acting schools, many parents choose based on how close they are to home, rather than the school's reputation. Are its teachers or directors working now in the industry? Have any of its alumni been cast in movies, film, Broadway or television? Are students taught how to read dialogue, choose material, and audition competitively?

When Ms. Allan returned to Gateway from the West Coast in the early 90's, she opened the Acting School division so children could seriously learn the profession. "I'm not saying it isn't fun or at all a positive experience for many kids to become involved in school plays or amateur theater productions," she explained, "For some, it is their first, and therefore very important introduction to performing. And some kids are innately gifted in acting. Many kids that I auditioned in Los Angeles had a natural acting style and they were believable at first reads. When we had to send them to producers, however, or to network tests for series, we always encouraged them to take class, or be coached by professionals in order to compete. Even though the work is more plentiful now, and there is more lucrative pay, than in the day of Mama Rose and the Vaudeville Circuit, to be chosen for high profile roles and jobs in professional theater and in the entertainment industry at large, you need to be highly skilled and ready for anything. When your break comes, you need to be prepared!"

When Gateway last staged *Gypsy*, in 1992, Siri Howard (who later attended the Acting School) played Baby June. A few years later, Siri's training helped win her a part in the teen film satire, *Welcome To The Dollhouse*, and then the role of Liesel in the 1998 Broadway revival





of Sound Of Music. Sarah Drew, another Acting School alumna, appeared in Gateway's 1994 production of The Secret Garden - she auditioned with The Sopranos' Jamie-Lynn Siegler who wasn't cast. Sarah's early training and subsequent higher education presumably aided her in being cast in last year's smash Cuba Gooding Jr. film, Radio.

For this production of *Gypsy*, Ms. Allan conducted a search for a girl to play Baby June that evoked Selznick's search for Scarlett O'Hara. "There were little girls who were wonderful singers, or great gymnasts, or amazing dancers...but they weren't quite right," she explained. Two open auditions were held, and at the latter, lucky number thirteen, Miss Janelle Viscomi, "bounced down the aisle," remembered Robin. She turned to her assistant and said, 'cross your fingers, this could be the one we've been waiting for.' Janelle stood

out yards beyond the other contenders. "She had everything", Ms. Allan explained, "Amazing dance ability, a great belter, a gymnast, a twirler, was the right age and size for the role, and on top of all that she was charming. Baby June doesn't say a lot in this show, but she sure has to exude lots of charm."

June Hovick eventually did make it to Broadway - she changed her name to Havoc, landed chorus jobs in summer stocks across the country, which eventually led to a featured dance routine in Forbidden Melody. Still, it was four years between that show and her big break in Pal Joey. She played supporting roles in a few mostly forgettable films in Hollywood, and returned to Broadway for Mexican Hayride, but she never became the dramatic leading lady she yearned to be. With the right training, who knows what she might have been?

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or her child on stage or screen. No parent wants to see their child hurt, but show business is one of the toughest, most rejecting there is. Parents have to put in a lot of time, taking the child to have headshots made, to auditions, to agents, to callbacks, to rehearsals, to performances. They are the ones who help learn the lines. It's often as much of a job for the parent as for the child, and it can be frustrating to commit so many resources with so little guaranteed return. In Rose's day, when show business was looked down on, the parent also was the manager and often the producer of the act, responsible for writing the material, acquiring props and costumes, making bookings and finding transportation and accommodations. It's no wonder she was driven to make producers see her kids how she did. "You have to give her enough endearing qualities for the audience to understand why Herbie staws around, why Louise stays," explained Neal, "You have to understand her, empathize with her." Director Scott Thompson agrees. "You don't play a monster, you let the audience figure out what a monster she is. She thinks it is a grand fun ride, and can't believe that anyone wouldn't want to come on her fabulous journey. She doesn't understand that children need stability," he said.

In the end, of course, the child grows up, and parents have only those few years of childhood to forge a bond that will keep them in their grown children's lives. In real life, June and Gypsy ultimately had an armed-truce of a relationship with their mother - they were alternately amused, admiring of, appalled by Rose's manipulations, which continued after her

daughters were adults. Unable to let go, Rose drove her children crazy as she desperately tried to remain in their orbit, to the point where they spent decades communicating only through lawyers. Sadly, Hollywood is still full of monster Mama

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
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
